Assistive Technology (AT)

Equipment that

- > Helps provide and/or improve access to learning for students with exceptionalities
 - Devices (Computers, Tablets, Laptops)
 - Software & extensions (Text-to-Voice, Voice-to-Text, Word Prediction, Spell Check, Dictionary etc.)


Alternate Format Materials (AFM)

Learning resources in formats that

- Help provide and/or improve access to learning for students with exceptionalities
 - Are protected by copyright law
 - Are specifically created to meet the needs of individuals with print disabilities.



Creating Independent Learners



Alternate Format Materials

Section 32 of Canadian Copyright Act allows individuals with a print disability or persons acting on their behalf, access to works protected by copyright in accessible formats such as braille, audio, and electronic text.

 Not permitted if the resource is already commercially available in an appropria format.


Print Disabilities

A print disability interferes with a person's ability to read traditional print materials & includes disabilities/ exceptionalities which result in:

- Visual impairments
- The inability to hold or manipulate a book
- Impairments in reading comprehension



What are Alternate Formats?



- Accessible formats such as
 - Digital Audio
 - DAISY
 - Digital text files such as accessible PDF, accessible Word and accessible E-Pub


Digital Audio



Includes audiobooks, MP3 files, and DAISY MP3 files

- → Many are commercially available and readily available in libraries, schools, homes for access by any student
- → Students with print disabilities also have access to wide selection of these resources that are not commercially available but have been specifically created

DAISY



- → Digital Accessible Information System or DAISY Books
 - Are digital audio books with advanced navigational aids
 - Allow readers to easily move around book by page, chapter or sentence
 - ◆ Like other digital audio resources, they can be used on computers, mobile phones, tablets and MP3 players

Accessible Digital Text Files

- Are similar to E-books but are unlocked and tagged to allow use with text to voice software
- Many contain navigational aids to help users move easily from page to page or section to section


Come in formats such as PDF, Word & E-Pub

Accessible E-Pub



- Newer format which contain many accessibility features such as advanced navigational aids.
- > E-Pub files are starting to replace DAISY as a preferred format for AFM.
- > Like DAISY, they require playback software which can be acquired for free



- Anyone can browse content listing to search for AFM resources
- Approved students are resources

Access to AFM-NL

Schools apply to AFM-NL for student access

- → Initial application
- → Each year Request to continue access
- → Teachers provide approved students access to AFM-NL resources
- → Teachers can request resources currently not available
